## John W. Jung Scholarship

The JWJ Memorial set out to find a UW student that embodied the character, work ethic and leadership John exuded every day of his life.

Exceeding expectations, we found more than twenty young adults that will without doubt make incredible contributions to the world around them.

Twenty-one high school seniors from across Wisconsin applied for the first John W. Jung Scholarship Award. Members of the **JWJ Scholarship Committee** read more

than 300 pages of essays, letters of recommendation, transcripts and financial documents, finally choosing nine men and women to attend half -hour interviews.

Jessica Bloodgood, Blake Hutchinson, Matt Kopac, Tom O'Day and Melissa Wollering spent a hot Sunday in July in the cool confines of Tom's law office, Godfrey & Kahn in Milwaukee. The recipient was selected based on academic achievement, leadership, community involvement and financial need.

Eileen Malloy-Molzberger was named the 2007 JWJ Scholarship Recipient. She receives one semester of tuition worth approximately \$4,300 to attend UW-Madison. The award is renewable for one additional academic year.

Through fundraising efforts, the committee hopes to make the scholarship self-sustainable.

## Scholarship Recipient 2007: Meet Eileen

Eileen Malloy-Molzberger is a 2007 graduate of Catholic Memorial High School and a Waukesha native.

Eileen lives with Autosomal Dominant Optic Atrophy. ADOA is a genetic, degenerative eye disease that has left her legally blind in one eye. Eileen refused to use large print books in school and found other ways to cope.

"Just like the blind, who rely heavily upon their other senses, I learned how to listen to each word my teachers said," says Malloy-Molzberger.

Despite her challenges, Eileen finished in the top fifteen percent of her class with a cumulative G.P.A. of 4.183.

Eileen completed an International Baccalaureate Degree through her high school, receiving 28 college credits that can be applied towards her studies at UW-Madison.

One of Eileen's most important stress relievers trots on four hooves. Eileen cares for and rides horses. For years, she has worked cleaning stalls after school, on weekends and during the summer to pay for lessons. Eileen says horseback riding has taught her patience, perseverance and hard work.

"I discover my inner strength when working with horses. When controlling a 1,200 pound animal, there is no room for error, hesitation or doubt in oneself."

Eileen is an accomplished member of the American Saddlebred International Youth Program. She has won firstplace individual and team awards from the American Saddlebred Horse Association.

Eileen is also the founder of a project that continues to help people halfway around the globe. Eileen spearheaded the Darfur Relief Project at Catholic Memorial in 2006. Students from the school work closely with Catholic Relief Services, raising money to build wells in the Sudanese region of Africa.

In the summer of 2006, Eileen traveled to Ashland, Montana to repair and paint homes for indigent Native Americans. Eileen, along with members of her church's youth group stayed on the Lame Deer Na-

tive American Reservation there.

Eileen cares deeply about the issues and challenges surrounding alcoholism and recovery. Eileen's father battled alcoholism and died at the age of 39. Still, Eileen says he was able to overcome his addiction and fulfill his dreams before his passing.

"He got over his addictions with the help of AA, the support of my mom and his faith in God," says Malloy-Molzberger. "Like John, my father was charismatic, loving and brilliant. Those who knew my father would not have guessed he had a problem with alcohol."

Eileen is also a talented musician with experience playing the piano, violin, clarinet and guitar. Eileen has thought about pursuing a career in veterinary medicine, but is keeping an open mind.

"I am also looking into Journalism and Political Science and pursuing law school. I know I want to work with others and help those that might not have a voice of their own."

#### Mission and Background

The Memorial operates on three principal goals:

- 1. Celebrate life by organizing or participating in at least two public events every year;
- Recognizing student achievement by providing scholarships and mentorship to incoming students at the University of Wisconsin-Madison;
- Help those who suffer from addictions by spreading awareness and researching strategies to help educational institutions and hospitals confront the issue of addiction among students and medical professionals.

The three goals, though independent on paper, are interrelated on every level. The Memorial's public celebrations also raise money for scholarships and awareness campaigns; the scholarship program supports students who display extraordinary leadership qualities and encourages them to address issues of alcoholism and drug addiction on campus; and the focus on assisting those with addictions infuses another layer of purpose into all of the Memorial's activities.
